METHODOLOGY:

The sample size for the survey is 514 likely Republican Presidential primary voters in New Hampshire and the margin of error is +/-4.29%. Responses were gathered through land line interviews conducted using Interactive Voice Response (IVR). The survey was conducted December 1-3, 2015 by Harper Polling. The total percentages for responses may not equal 100% due to rounding.
